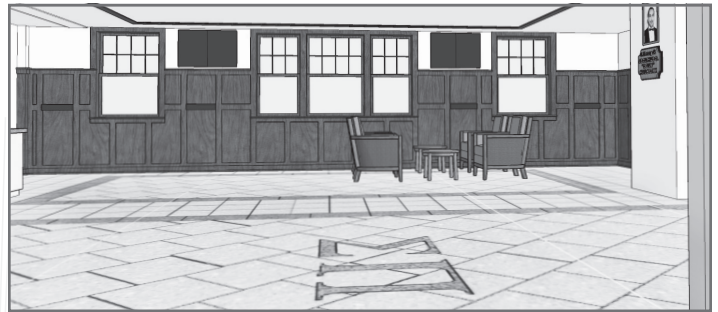
Sigma Pi house on a calm September morning.

The Dining and Learning for the 21st Century campaign continues to progress well. The committee has selected a contractor for the construction phase of the project. The target date for work to begin is June 4, 2018, one week after Cornell commencement ceremonies, and we anticipate final completion of the project later in the summer.

We expect to continue our successful fundraising up to and through the beginning of construction. We are asking all Sigma Pi alumni to contribute, especially those from class years that have yet to participate in the project. With new contributors and the continued hard work of many alumni and friends of Sigma Pi, we look forward to being able to fully fund this project before the work begins.

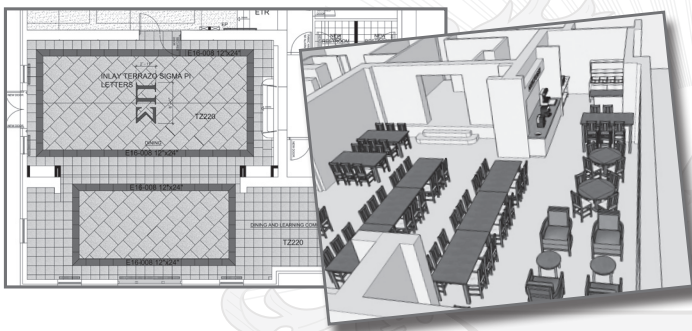

CAMPAIGN AND PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS:

- + Fundraising support from our alumni, parents, and friends continues to be robust, and momentum continues to build. However, to satisfactorily complete the project, we need to expand and increase participation across all alumni classes.
- + Total pledges and contributions as of October 31, 2017: **\$425,000** of the **\$650,000** goal.
- + Remaining fundraising needed: **\$235,000**.
- + The vast majority of funds that we have received to date have come from the classes of the late '70s and early '80s.
- + Many of our younger alumni have contributed as well. The main focus remains on increasing participation across the alumni population base. Mu Chapter has approximately **1,250** living alumni.
- + More than **170** alumni have contributed to the campaign, which is approximately **14%** of the alumni population.
- + We have **100%** participation from the undergraduates in giving to the campaign. We are also happy to report that parents of undergraduates have also been strong supporters of the project.
- + The undergraduates organized two fundraising phone-a-thons in September as part of their efforts.

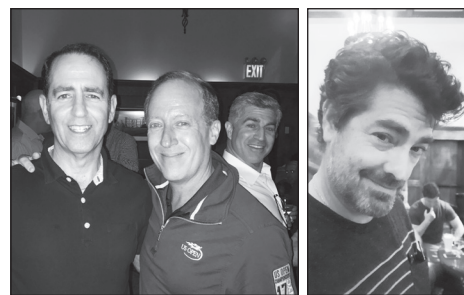

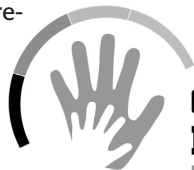

The annual meeting of Mu Chapter of Sigma Pi Fraternity of the United States was held on Thursday, September 28. Once again, the alumni board made an increased effort to garner alumni proxies submitted electronically, which would provide the alumni corporation the needed quorum to conduct the annual meeting in accordance with our bylaws.

I am happy to report that we received **185 proxies, representing 14% of our active membership** (alumni and undergraduate). Thanks to all who participated. Elections for alumni directors were held, and, by unanimous vote, the current alumni slate of directors was re-elected for another year. The alumni board also elected or re-elected its slate of officers for one-year terms: **Jarett Wait '80**, president; **Kurt Rasmussen '80**, vice president; **John Haggerty '78**, treasurer and faculty advisor; and **Rob Novo '79**, secretary.

Treasurer's Report: Fall 2017 Update

Having eliminated the mortgage at the conclusion of the Centennial Campaign in 2015, Mu Chapter is now in a position to undertake projects of much greater significance to the maintenance and upgrade of the house without incurring debt.

We began with the installation of new high-quality windows for the entire third floor and selected windows on other floors, a project long anticipated but not possible while we serviced the mortgage. This past summer (2017), we completed the gutting and rebuilding of the second-floor bathroom and showers, utilizing modern building materials that are much easier to keep clean, increased ventilation to control moisture, and installed an electric hand dryer to reduce waste. This upgrade is particularly popular with the undergraduate brothers! Many other smaller but important projects were also completed to keep Sigma Pi among the best-maintained houses on the Hill. If you are coming back to

the chapter house to visit, please take some time to look around!

We are financially sound with no debt, and as long as the house remains near capacity (35-45 brothers living in), we will generate adequate revenue to continue to operate the house and to make reasonable improvements. Major changes, such as the Dining and Learning project, or unanticipated substantial repairs to the facility will require further fund raising.

Our relationship with our bank, Tompkins Trust Company, remains very strong. Should the fundraising efforts for the learning commons fall short, we are assured of a short-term line of credit to close the gap and to allow the project to be finished while the remaining funds are raised and collected.

If you find yourself planning a visit to Ithaca for any reason, please give me a heads up. I would be delighted to show you around your house! Thank you for all the support of our efforts to keep Sigma Pi a leader for another 100 years!

Continuing Work Improves Pi House

In addition to dozens of minor repairs over the summer break, the following more significant items were completed:

- A card reader was installed on the front door to allow students access, using their Cornell ID cards.
- Holes in the waterproof membrane of the Beach were repaired, and metal flashing was installed to protect the membrane from wear.
- A fenced-in storage area was installed in the rear of the house for materials used outdoors by undergrads, such as reusable fencing for parties. This was done to improve safety and appearance.

The most significant work was the refurbishment of the second-floor bathroom. Mold and cleaning challenges have plagued the second-floor bathroom for years. New tile was installed in the shower

stalls and shower ceilings, and improved ventilation, new fluorescent lighting with LED fixtures, an electric hand dryer, additional electrical outlets, motion sensors for lighting and ventilation, and new stall partitions were also installed. **Liviu Rusu '98** laid a new, smooth concrete floor over the existing floor tile, which had badly stained grout. The project cost about \$40,000. We hope to come up with necessary funds to do the third-floor bathroom next summer.

The Facilities Committee maintains a list of repairs and upgrades that it is considering and distributes it periodically to board members. That list currently includes potential projects and purchases estimated to cost a total of about \$240,000. They are worked off as funds become available.

Chapter House Owned by Brotherhood

Almost 100 years ago, on December 13, 1917, the brothers of Alpha Chapter of Omega Delta Fraternity Inc. gathered at 730 University Avenue for the purpose of changing the name of their chapter. The result of the meeting was that our chapter became officially known as The Mu Chapter of the Sigma Pi Fraternity of the United States Inc. The chapter was incorporated under the State of New York Member Corporation Law but is now subject to the New York State Not-For-Profit Corporation Law (the corporation is not a federal 501(c)(3) entity and, therefore, not able to receive tax-deductible contributions). The corporation is owned by its members, both alumni and undergraduate. Each member is entitled to vote at the annual meeting of the corporation, which occurs in September or October of every year.

According to our records, the corporation has almost 1,300 members: 63 undergrad members and 1,252 alumni members at the time of penning! Each year, the membership elects a board of directors, who are charged with overseeing the operations of the corporation. The board currently consists of 16 members who make up various committees of the board, divided by function: legal, facilities, brotherhood, etc. The board, in turn, elects officers to work with the undergraduate members to ensure that the work necessary to keep up the day to day operations is accomplished. The officers consist of the president (**Jarett Wait '80**), vice president (**Kurt Rasmussen '80**), treasurer (**John Haggerty '78**) and secretary (**Rob Novo '79**).

The corporation owns the land at 730 University Avenue, the house, and all of the personal property located in the house (except the personal property owned by the undergraduate members living in the house).

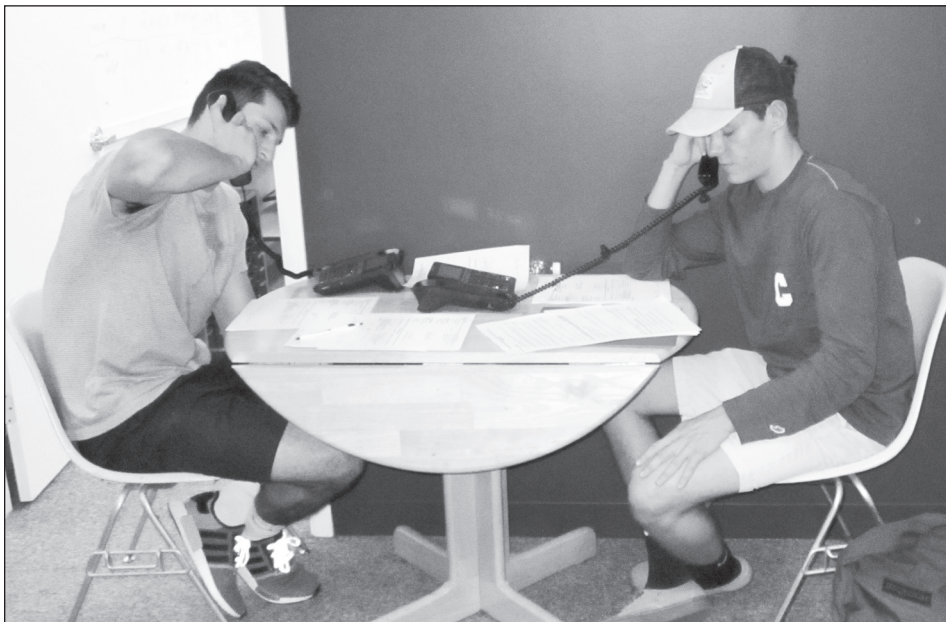
